

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Students after the workshop at MDIS, left for Vlovlo reached by 1.45 pm. Students walked around the Volvo corporate campus and were amazed to see the pototypes of their vehicles which is considered the best in the wolrd for its quality and efficiency later were addressed by Mr. Pranob, HR Manager of Volvo, Singapore at the Board room.

During the seminar, students learnt about the organization. i.e. Volvo was established in 1915 as a subsidiary of SKF, a ball bearing manufacturer; however both the Volvo Group and Volvo Cars regard the rollout of the company's first car series, the Volvo ÖV 4, on 14 April 1927, as their beginning. 1924, Assar Gabrielsson, an SKF sales manager, and a KTH Royal Institute of Technology educated engineer

Gustav Larson, the two founders decided to start construction of a Swedish car. They intended to build cars that could withstand the rigors of the country's rough roads and cold temperatures. AB Volvo began activities on 10 August 1926. After one year of preparations involving the production of ten prototypes, the firm was ready to commence the car-manufacturing business within the SKF group.

Volvo Group's operations include: Volvo Trucks (midsize-duty trucks for regional transportation and heavy-duty trucks for long distance transportation, as well as heavy-duty trucks for the construction work segment), Mack Trucks (light-duty trucks for close distribution and heavy-duty trucks for long distance transportation), Renault Trucks (heavy-duty trucks for regional transportations and heavy-duty trucks for the construction work segment), UD Trucks (midsize-duty trucks), Dongfeng Commercial Vehicles (45%) (trucks), VE Commercial Vehicles (Eicher) Ltd., India (VECV), a joint venture between Volvo Group and Eicher Motors Limited in which Volvo holds 45.6% (trucks and buses), Volvo Construction Equipment (construction equipment), SDLG (70%) (construction equipment), Volvo Buses (complete buses and bus chassis for city traffic, line traffic and tourist traffic), Volvo Financial Services (customer financing, inter-group banking, as real estate administration), Volvo Penta (marine engine systems for leisure boats and commercial shipping, diesel engines and drive systems for industrial applications), Arquus.

After the seminar, students asked doubts and room beacame very vibrant with Q and A's. We departed at 5 pm from the Volvo campus to MDIS campus.

We started for Industry visit to Financial district – URA visit early at 8:15 am, the tour was arranged by Ms.Esther from SIM, reached URA at 9.00 am where we met the Guide, who escorted and briefed us about Urban Redevelopment Authority. URA's main responsibility is land-use planning. URA planners devise both long-term strategic land use plans and medium-term plans which are reviewed every five to ten years. These plans designate the land use and urban density for the entirety of Singapore, which is divided by URA into 55 planning areas. This is the responsibility of URA to evaluate and grant planning approval for development projects from the public and private sectors. In approving development applications, the URA states its goal is to foster orderly development conforming to the planning guidelines as stated in the statutory Master Plan and the existing control factors. URA tries to provide quality service when working in partnership with building industry professionals and the general public to foster development.



















Visit to Mariana Barrage:









This innovative facility not only supplies water to Singaporeans and helps alleviate floods, but also doubles up as a place for family fun. The Marina Barrage is an ideal spot for a dose of education, mixed with fun in the sun and recreation on the water.

In Singapore, even something as common as a reservoir can be turned into a hotspot for recreational activities. Built across the mouth of the 350-metre-wide Marina Channel, the Marina Barrage creates the country's 15th reservoir, with a catchment area that spans a whopping 10,000 hectares. As the water in the reservoir remains calm all year around, it's ideal

for some soaking wet fun, whether it's kayaking or, for the more team-spirited, a dragon boat race.

If water sports is not your thing, head to the rooftop of the barrage, which boasts a green space that's popular for flying a kite, or just to chill out with the family. The Marina Barrage also plays an important part in helping to alleviate flooding in some of the lower lying areas of the island. During periods of heavy rain, a series of nine crest gates will be opened to release excess storm water into the sea when the tide is low. When the tide is high, seven giant pumps that are capable of pumping one Olympic-sized swimming pool per minute whirr into action, draining water into the sea. The facility is also a showcase for Singapore's push to be a greener country. The Solar Park, for instance, features one of the largest collections of solar panels in Singapore, with over 400 panels providing electricity needed for lighting at the barrage during the day.

We found more about the country's efforts to go green, head to the Sustainable Singapore Gallery at the barrage's ground floor. This educational space illustrates environmental and water issues through interactive multi-media displays, exhibits, with the help of guided tour.







Industry Visit to Yalkult Factory









This was an educational visit for students to have an overview of the production, packaging process and the distribution channel of the fast moving consumer product.

Discovery of Biotechnology Plant: Yakult Singapore

It started with a presentation on the background of Yakult and the company. Our students and staff also watched a scientific documentary on the advantages of probiotics and an animated video on the role of how probiotics plays in the maintenance of the digestive system. Our students and staff even got the opportunity to enjoy a complimentary bottle of Yakult.

Some interesting facts that we had learned during the tour was that Singapore is the only country that Yakult produces 4 flavours whereas the other countries only produce the original flavour. The Yakult bottles are also bigger in Singapore, Hong Kong, China and Taiwan as compared to other countries. It was an eye-opening visit for students as they got good understanding of how Yakult was produced.

The students enjoyed the visit and found it insightful and enriching.

Visit to NEWATER:

It has been 17 years since Singapore's first NEWater plant opened in Bedok in 2003. This working factory also houses the NEWater Visitor Centre where you can learn about one of Singapore's National Taps. The tour at the NEWater Visitor Centre started off with a video screening on the importance of water to Singapore. It emphasised the need to conserve water, a central theme that underpins the visit. There are exhibits such as information displays providing facts and figures about water usage and the importance of water conservation.

The Factory Floor: After a run-through of the Deep Tunnel Sewage System and an introduction to NEWater, comes the highlight of the visit to the NEWater Visitor Centre, we had a chance to view the NEWater factory including the gallery. The tour at the NEWater Visitor Centre concludes with a look at the factory control room and an opportunity to pledge to conserve water.









Report on Students' Immersion Trip 1st February 2023 to 8th February 2023

Day 1 - 1st Feb.,2023

On the first day of the Immersion trip we had a brief orientation at MDIS. They explained about the courses offered and the various partnering Universities.

Students were told about the eligibility criteria and the evaluation method used for the various courses.

An overview of the week's program was presented to the students. We were taken on a city tour. We visited Little India, China Town, Kampong Glam and the Merlion statue.

Day 2 - 2nd Feb.,2023

It started with a session on International Trade by Professor Philip Yu. It was an experience based session. Prof Yu has been trading with different parts of world (more than 68 countries.) for over 45 years. The students were given an assignment to make a presentation on a product that they would like to export from their country. Students have to make a presentation on 7th Feb.

After that students visited the URA centre. At the URA (Urban Redevelopment Authority, Singapore) centre they learnt how Singapore was developed into a modern city state. They learnt how the land was reclaimed for development and the water purification process and desalination plants introduced in order to ensure sustainable development.

Singapore is a city in a garden where there are more trees than there are residents.

In the evening most of the students headed out for the Night Safari.

Day 3 - 3rd Feb.,2023

It began with a session by Prof Clement Ng on Leadership. The session was case study based. Students were divided into groups and after each concept was explained a case was presented for which the students had to use the concepts explained to find a solution.

In the afternoon one group of students visited the Volvo factory and the other group went to Tiger Brewery.

At Tiger Brewery, the history of the Brewery and the brewing process was explained to the students. The students were given free samples of different beers at the in-house Tavern. Each student was given a complimentary bottle of Tiger beer bottle as a souvenir.



At the Volvo factory the students were given a presentation about the factory and the rules and regulations observed within the factory. A management trainee shared her experience at Volvo. Students were also given a high tea at the factory.

Day 6 - 6th Feb.,2023

Morning session was on 'Out of the Box Thinking and Problem Solving' by Prof Caroline Dawson. Prof Dawson discuss the difference between the right brain and the left brain and the importance of integrating both. She also discussed the different learning styles, 8 - IQ Skills, 5 Why's etc. She explained what Mind Mapping was and asked the students in groups of 5 to create a mind map on their Singapore Study Trip.



She discussed the 6 Thinking Hats and the importance of each of the hats and how they could be used in corporate life. The session was extremely interesting and the students enjoyed themselves as there were several activities involved.

The most important highlight of her session was that everyone is capable of learning, anything can be learnt if they just started doing things.

In the afternoon we visited the Volvo Logistics centre at Singapore. This trip was organised by 6 Mr Pronob Chetia, Director HR Volvo and Board Member ISME. Students were given a company overview of the products, the values and the foundations on which the company was built.

The MD of Volvo, Singapore, Mr David Bazyn addressed the students and shared his life long experience with compounding and the significance of compounding which was explained even by Albert Einstein.

Mr. Bazyn explained how he had found his way of unwinding through biking and reading which was his "white space" allowed his brain to generate new ideas and relax. Students and Prof Shyam Prasad posed a number of questions to Mr Bazyn on supply chain management for Logistics.

Ms. Caroline, Volvo apprentice from Lyon France shared her experience of working with Volvo France and Volvo Singapore.

Mr Pranav Kaul of BBA 5th semester proposed the vote of thanks on behalf of ISME.

Day 7 - 7th Feb.,2023

In continuation with his lecture on International Trade Prof Philip Yu delivered a lecture on E - Commerce and Cross Border E-commerce.

He used the examples of Amazon and Alibaba to illustrate E Commerce and Cross Border E Commerce.

Prof Yu gave an over view of all the requirements and the salient points to be followed while engaging in Cross Border E Commerce.



After this the students were divided into 6 groups and each group had to pick a product they wanted to export to a specific country and come up with a concrete plan to do the same. They were also made to present their plan for E Commerce to the class.

Students picked commodities like coffee, tea, saffron, gold jewellery etc.

The best presentation was selected and the winners were given a small gift as a prize.

At 2.00 pm we visited NeWater water purification and desalination plant. Here the entire process of cleaning and purifying used water was explained with the help of short audio visual presentations and simulations that were explained to the students.

Various measures taken by Singapore to reduce water wastage in order to conserve water were also explained. Singapore has won several international awards for its water purification and water conservation efforts. Also we had a good meeting with Esther Tong at 11.00 am in SIM. We discussed Singapore Study program, Corporate Training, IBSP and faculty exchange for delivering lectures.

- 2. One student Pratham Ahuja tested positive for the mandatory RTPCR test and had to stay back for 3 days. MDIS made special arrangements for his stay.































































Date: 20th June 2023 (Tuesday)

Departure to Kempegowda International Airport from ISME Campus

Workshop on "Great Team, Great Work"

become better team players. The session also introduced the ACT

(Acknowledge, Correct, and Thank) approach, combined with TACT (Positivity

Sandwich) for effective communication within teams.

During the workshop, Prof. Chew emphasised the importance of using positive

language and words in fostering a constructive team environment. Participants

engaged in practical exercises to identify and implement positive language in

their everyday communication.

The concept of psychological safety in teamwork was discussed, highlighting its

significance in promoting trust, collaboration, and innovation within teams.

Prof. Chew shared strategies and techniques to create a psychologically safe

space, accompanied by relevant examples and case studies.

The workshop also focused on individual growth as team players. Prof. Chew

provided insights and practical tips for participants to contribute effectively to

their teams. Through group activities and discussions, participants identified

their strengths and areas for improvement in their teamwork skills.

The ACT with TACT approach was introduced as a constructive feedback

technique. Prof. Chew emphasised the importance of framing feedback using

the TACT method, sandwiching constructive feedback between positive

elements. Participants practised giving and receiving feedback using this

framework.

Workshop on "Introduction of International Trade"

Dr. Philip Yu, also fondly referred to as The Flying Horse, covered the various topics related to international trade. Tiger Brewery Guided Tour

The visit was divided into two batches. The first batch, consisting of 40 students, arrived at Tiger Brewery at 1 PM. They were guided by Prof. Sriram Prabhakar. The second and third batches were combined due to scheduling reasons. This combined batch, comprising 52

students, visited Tiger Brewery at 3 PM. They were guided by Dr. R. Ratchana.

Upon arrival at Tiger Brewery, both the batches were warmly welcomed by the staff members who provided a brief introduction to the brewery's history and significance in the beer industry. The visit was guided by an experienced tour guide who led the participants through the various sections of the brewery.

The tour started by visiting the brewhouse, where the beer production process

begins. The tour guide explained the key steps involved in brewing beer, including malt milling, mashing, boiling, fermentation, and filtration. The participants observed the large vessels used for each step and gained a comprehensive understanding of the complex brewing process. Tiger Brewery emphasized its commitment to maintaining high-quality standards throughout the production process. The visitors were shown the quality control laboratory, where rigorous testing and analysis are conducted on raw materials, intermediate products, and finished beers. The tour guide explained the importance of quality control in ensuring consistent taste and meeting customer

Next, the batches were taken to the packaging area, where the freshly brewed beer is packaged into bottles, cans, and kegs. They observed the automated machinery in action and learned about the labelling and packaging procedures. The tour guide explained the implementation of energy-efficient technologies and waste management practices, which impressed us as environmentally responsible measures. Throughout the tour, the visitors noticed the brewery's strict adherence to safety and hygiene protocols.

During the visit, Tiger Brewery incorporated fun activities to enhance the visitor experience. Volunteers from the batches were taught how to fill beer mugs and create a frothy head. They were given the opportunity to pour beer into a mug, create a froth, and then chug the beer as a demonstration of the beer drinking experience. This hands-on activity allowed the visitors to actively participate and get a taste of the beer culture.

After the interactive activity, the visitors were led to the cafe and bar area of Tiger Brewery. 

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


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

Workshop on "Out of the box Thinking and Problem Solving"

Caroline Josephine Dawson conducted an interactive workshop on Out-of-the-Box Thinking and Problem Solving. The workshop aimed to equip participants with essential thinking skills and techniques to approach problem-solving creatively and analytically. Various topics were covered, including how to receive information, understanding learning styles, the importance of thinking skills, creative and analytical thinking, and specific processes such as creative visualisation, root cause analysis, brainstorming, mind mapping, radiant thinking, idea blooming, affinity diagrams, and Edward de Bono's thinking hats.

The workshop began by discussing how individuals receive information and the role of the five senses or learning styles in processing and comprehending information effectively. Participants gained insights into their preferred learning styles and how to leverage them for improved thinking and problem-solving.

Caroline Josephine Dawson emphasised the need for thinking skills in today's fast-paced and complex world. The participants learned about the importance of developing both creative and analytical thinking abilities to approach problems from different angles. The creative thinking process was explored using techniques such as creative visualisation, which involved using mental imagery to generate innovative ideas and solutions.

Root cause analysis was discussed as a tool for identifying the underlying causes of problems and finding effective solutions. Brainstorming and mind mapping techniques were introduced to encourage participants to generate a wide range of ideas and organise them visually. Radiant thinking, employing thought grabbers and mind associations, was explained as a method to enhance

creativity and expand thinking horizons. Participants also learned about idea killers and how to overcome them to foster a more open and supportive environment for ideation. Idea blooming, the process of nurturing and developing initial ideas into fully-formed concepts, was explored.

The workshop introduced affinity diagrams, a visual tool to categorise and group ideas, and discussed how they could be used to organise and prioritise information during problem-solving sessions. Edward de Bono's thinking hats concept was presented as a structured approach to thinking, with each hat representing a different thinking style. Participants were encouraged to wear different "hats" to explore problems and generate ideas from various perspectives.

To actively engage the students, several activities were incorporated into the workshop. These activities allowed participants to apply the newly learned techniques and collaborate with their peers, fostering a dynamic and interactive learning environment.





Industrial Visit to NEWater Plant

On 27th June, the industrial visit to the NEWater Plant commenced at 8:00 AM

from the MDIS campus in 2 buses guided by Mr. Pacer and Ms. Selena, the tour

guides. The journey took approximately one hour, and the group arrived at the

NEWater Plant around 9:00 AM.

Upon arrival, the participants were greeted by the staff of the NEWater Plant,

who provided an overview of the plant and the water treatment process. The

group was then guided to the designated area where the tour of the facility

began.

The NEWater Plant is a state-of-the-art water reclamation facility that plays a

crucial role in Singapore's water management strategy. It utilises advanced

treatment processes to transform wastewater into high-grade reclaimed water.

The plant has a capacity to treat and produce approximately 85 million gallons

(or 390,000 cubic metres) of reclaimed water per day. This helps to meet a

significant portion of Singapore's water demand. The plant employs a

multi-barrier approach to ensure the production of high-quality reclaimed water.

The treatment process includes microfiltration, reverse osmosis, and advanced

ultraviolet disinfection. These processes effectively remove suspended solids,

dissolved impurities, and microorganisms, resulting in purified water.

During the visit, the participants observed the different stages of the water

reclamation process. The knowledgeable staff guided them through each step,

explaining the significance and intricacies of the procedures. They witnessed the

intake of wastewater and its transformation through processes such as

microfiltration, reverse osmosis, and ultraviolet disinfection.

One of the key takeaways from the visit was the emphasis on maintaining water quality. The staff highlighted the rigorous quality control measures implemented at the NEWater Plant. They explained the extensive testing and monitoring procedures carried out to ensure that the reclaimed water meets regulatory standards for various uses, including industrial and potable purposes. It is continuously monitored and tested to ensure compliance with the Singapore Public Utilities Board's (PUB) Drinking Water Quality Standard and the World Health Organization (WHO) guidelines for drinking water.

The NEWater Plant also features interactive exhibits that explain the water treatment process in a fun and engaging way. Visitors can learn through hands-on activities, multimedia displays, and informative panels. These exhibits make the learning experience interactive and enjoyable for both kids and adults. The plant offers educational videos and presentations that provide comprehensive information about water treatment, recycling, and sustainability. These resources are suitable for both kids and adults and offer an engaging way to learn about the importance of water management.

The participants were impressed by the advanced technologies utilised at the plant. The microfiltration membranes and reverse osmosis systems showcased the cutting-edge methods employed to remove impurities and contaminants from the wastewater, resulting in purified water of high quality. The visit also shed light on the plant's commitment to sustainability and water conservation. The participants learned about the energy-efficient operations and the efforts made to minimise the environmental impact of the water reclamation process. It was inspiring for them to witness how Singapore efficiently utilises its limited water resources.





Field Visit to The Urban Redevelopment Authority (URA) Centre
